lane Phillips, who are both parents themselves, sat down to kindle a conversation amongst parents about how to prioritize our role in the faith formation of our children. This podcast series is a perfect listen for parents of children looking for ways they can connect their children with Christ and the church community.

Heart Math Tutoring BE A TUTOR, MAKE A DIFFERENCE

Heart Math Tutoring (HMT) is on a mission to transform young lives through math education. This innovative program

Heart Math Tutoring

offers elementary school students, particularly those in first-fifth grades who are performing below grade level, the opportunity to develop a strong foundation in math. Through onetutoring on-one

sessions delivered by volunteers, HMT not only strengthens students' math skills but builds their enthusiasm for academics, laying the groundwork for long-term success.

Since its inception as an independent nonprofit in 2013, Heart Math Tutoring has grown significantly. From its humble beginnings, serving just 105 students across two schools, the program now reaches nearly 1,300 students across 31 schools, including new initiatives in Winston-Salem and Charleston. This expansion would not be possible without the dedication of over 1,400 volunteer tutors who commit their time each week to make a difference.

First Presbyterian members have been involved in founding and leading Heart Math Tutoring throughout its history. FPC Members Minna Elliott, Catherine Fischer, Susan Daniel, Reid Leggett, and Martha Eubank were all part of the original pilot program in 2010. Eric Eubank, Connie Carlson, and Anne Leggett have served as Board Chair of Heart Math Tutoring during the past decade, with Connie Carlson serving

most recently for the past three years. Over 30 FPC members volunteered in 2023-24!

Anyone who wants to help children increase their confidence and knowledge in math is encouraged to become a tutor. No prior experience in math or teaching is required. Volunteers come from all walks of life—college students, working professionals, and retirees—all united by the common goal of helping children succeed. The program ensures that every volunteer is well-prepared through mandatory training sessions, ongoing support from an onsite program coordinator, and access to an extensive library of resources.

The impact HMT on students profound. is 97% Over of the program's more than 6,400 students have shown measurable growth in their math skills, as assessed by

Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools (CMS) and UNC-Charlotte. Beyond academics, students also experience a boost in confidence and enthusiasm for learning, with many attributing their newfound love for math to the personalized attention and encouragement they receive from their tutors.

Heart Math Tutoring continues to innovate in response to challenges. The program adapted to the COVID-19 pandemic by developing a virtual tutoring model and has recently introduced an extended learning model to provide even more comprehensive support. As HMT prepares to launch this new initiative at seven schools, the need for volunteers and financial support is greater than ever.
